He said this was delivering important benefits in the form of improved soil health and water retention, reduced runoff, fuel conservation, reduced green- house gas emissions and more efficient carbon storage in the soil. He said a reduction in ploughing had enabled farmers to use less fuel and store addi- tional carbon on the soil.

National Men's Handball Championship to be held from Feb 18 to 23

KANPUR: The 48th National Senior Men's Handball Championship would be organised here at the Green Park stadium from February 18 to 23. Addressing mediapers- ons, Divisional Commissioner and President of UP Handball Association Dr Sudhir M Bobde said 30 teams from dif- ferent states and two teams of Railways and Services will take part in the championship. There would be around 600 players and 60 officials seen in action during the champi- onship. General secretary Dr Anandeshwar Pandey said there would be total eight pools. After the league match- es, pre-quarter, quarter, semi- final and final matches would be played. Last year, this tour- nament was organised in Tamil Nadu wherein 30 teams had participated. Services team had won the gold, while Punjab team was awarded the silver and Haryana and Madhya Pradesh had jointly won the bronze medals. Tamil Nadu, Chandigarh, Indian Railway and Jharkhand had to remain content with 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th place respectively. This year, since UP team was the host which can be included in any pool, he informed. All the teams would reach Kanpur by February 17 evening. He said after the championship, auction for franchise teams (Haryana, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, UP, Delhi and Maharashtra) would be held on February 23 for partic- ipation in the Premier League to be held in Jaipur from March 5 to 23.

WORKSHOP: The Chief Medical Officer, Dr AK Shukla

addressing a workshop on 'Role of paramedics during epi- demics' allayed all apprehen- sions on coronavirus and said till date not a single case of coronavirus suspect had been identified in Kanpur nor sur- rounding areas. He advised the people not to panic and rely more on the age old adage 'pre- vention is better than cure'. He said however the medical department including the doc- tors and paramedical staff were well prepared to handle any eventuality if at all it occurred.

Later addressing the pareamedical staff of ID Hospital the Medical Officer, Dr Shashank Singh said although doctors were the backbone of the whole medical system but added that the nurses played an equal role especially at the time of out- break of epidemics. He said it was true that nurses played a significant role in public health and frequently served in posi- tions of responsibility at pub- lic health agencies, and helped the public stay healthy by assist- ing with the development, pro- motion and management of public health initiatives. He said nurses collaborated with local health departments and other organisations to provide health education, study popu- lation health changes, work on disease prevention initia- tives and coordinate similar efforts.

He said public health departments customise their work to fit the communities they served and the health needs of local populations. He said since there were many dif- ferent possible causes of disease

and types of illnesses, public health workers must be able to understand the underlying causes of disease to effectively stop transmission and prevent future cases. He said many public health efforts address issues of sanitation, personal interactions, and business or public practices that impact health everywhere nurses were needed at every level of public health work.

Dr Singh said preventing disease required that efforts were well-coordinated and responsive to community needs and when disease spreads nurses quickly respond with scienti- fically sound, sensible means of controlling the spread of ill- ness.

He said prevention of future outbreaks required that infection sources were identi- fied and properly managed.
